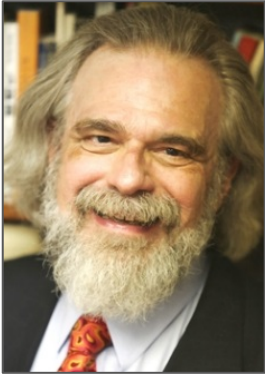




From the Minister



The Rev. Dr. Tony Johnson is serving as UCH Minister 2018-21.

As if the fall and early winter had not been busy enough, a lot more is coming during the late winter and spring: the first sessions of a year-long program on conflict and communication proposed by the Congregational Life

Team, approved by the Board of Trustees, and presented by the Neighborhood Dispute Center in Harrisburg; the election of a Ministerial Search Committee; the annual Stewardship Campaign; the soon-to-be concluded search for a new Director of Religious Exploration; the Book Shuffle. These are all in addition to the already broad and deep range of services, social and educational activities, social justice programs, and day-to-day activities of a vibrant and growing congregation.

I have already mentioned some aspects of congregational life as winter ends and spring arrives. I want to mention two more important events.

Because I have one Sunday off each month, there are opportunities for lay-led services and guest ministers to enrich your worship life. On Feb. 2, the Rev. Steven Jones will speak. He is a retired Lutheran minister and chaplain and a member of the UU Church of Lancaster, where he serves on the Ministerial Search Committee. On the first Sunday in March, a former minister of the Unitarian Church of Harrisburg will speak. The Rev. Lee Barker was minister here from 1978 until 1983. He has served congregations in Montclair, New Jersey and Pasadena, California. In 2003 he became President of the Meadville Lombard Theological School, from which he retired in 2019, after leading the school through its transformation into a 21st Century institution. Please plan on welcoming Steven Jones and Lee Barker to our pulpit.

In September, at the request of several members, I established a monthly open discussion (with no set agenda) on a Friday evening. The first two were well attended. Attendance dropped so low (to zero) that I have discontinued the open conversations. But I do want to hear from you and meet with you.

Because I do not live full time in Pennsylvania, scheduling meetings can be challenging. I provide this summary of my schedule. I am in the pulpit on the second, third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of the month. I am off on the first Sunday of each month. During the weeks that include a Sunday when I speak, I am in Harrisburg Wednesday through Sunday. During the weeks when I do not speak on Sunday, I am in Harrisburg on Wednesday and Thursday. I work in my home office (in New Jersey) on Tuesday every week and am available by phone during the day. I have office hours in Harrisburg on Wednesday and Friday and can schedule meetings at other times. You can reach me by dialing the church number and choosing the prompt to speak with the minister. The call will go to my cell phone. You may also email me at revjohnson@harrisburguu.org.

I look forward to hearing from and seeing you all through the month of February and beyond.

President's Message

I adopted a cat in early January. She's three years old, and her name is Indy.

I adopted her for the usual reason: my house was too quiet. I love my peace and quiet at home, but in moderation. I needed some other life in the house to stimulate my mind and keep me company.

The poor kitty had been at the shelter for 388 days. She's shy, so she could only go to a home with no kids and no other pets, and that made her difficult to adopt. Luckily, I don't have kids or other animals, and I prefer a shy cat that doesn't require constant attention. We are a good match.

I even got a good deal on the adoption. The shelter had waived the usual fees, to try to find her a home, but I gave them a donation anyway. They had spent a considerable sum on food, veterinarian care, staff, and housing during her year, and I appreciated what they had done.

All organizations have expenses, including our church congregation. I don't mean to equate an animal shelter with a church, of course. (Our church members are not animals!) Our community is nonetheless important to all of us, and it must be supported somehow.

Share the Plate: Prison Action Committee

Each month, we share half of our Sunday plate with a local non-profit organization. This month, we share the plate with the Prison Action Committee of Christian Churches United (CCU) of the Tri-County Area.

The Prison Action Committee (PAC), CCU's oldest ministry, is a volunteer committee serving as a voice for those incarcerated. The PAC supports both staff and volunteer pastoral care for inmates at Dauphin County Prison, training for churches and individuals wanting to support returning citizens, and supports community re-entry initiatives. The PAC works in partnership with the Dauphin County Work Release Center, the Capital Region Ex-Offender Support Coalition (CRESC), and numerous local churches and prison ministries in carrying out these efforts.



We will soon begin our stewardship campaign for the next fiscal year. It needs to be ready in time for you to vote on it at the congregational meeting in May. You will hear more from the stewardship team.

We do anticipate increasing our budget, for a few reasons. Staff salaries need to be brought up to UUA standards. Contributions to the UUA are only 25% of what they should be. There is deferred maintenance to catch up on. The upcoming search process also needs to be funded.

I am confident we can reach our goals. You continued to support the church during our years of transition, so I feel confident for our future. There are good days ahead of us.

My search for a cat didn't take long once I started looking. Our search for a settled minister, however, will take more than a year...even longer than my cat was in the shelter.

The process starts by forming a committee. Nominations for the committee come from the congregation. (The board has a very small role in the search process, other than to get it started and pay the bills.) The board will tally the nominations and the congregation will vote on them.

Members of the board have been calling each household to ask for nominations. If you haven't heard from us by Valentine's Day, please talk to one of us.

My home is better, now that my cat lives there with me. It's a tiny community of two, but two is better than one. Our church is my larger community, where I establish connections and grow. My cat and my congregation both cost me some time, energy, and money, but I don't mind. Both are worth it.

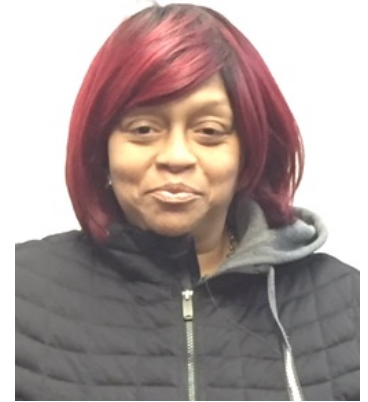



Wars, starvation, mass culls, poaching, and habitat loss have reduced elephant numbers from more than ten million to a few hundred thousand, leaving orphans bereft of the elders who would normally mentor them. As a consequence, traumatized elephants have become aggressive against people, other animals, and even one another; their behavior is comparable to that of humans who have experienced genocide, other types of violence, and social collapse. By exploring the elephant mind and experience in the wild and in captivity, Bradshaw bears witness to the breakdown of ancient elephant cultures.</p>
