




## From the Minister



The Rev. Dr. Tony Johnson is serving as UCH Minister 2018-21.

Three points for this month's column:

(1) I think that the Unitarian Church of Harrisburg is getting the hang of virtual church.

Together we have learned to make good

use of Zoom in worship and meetings—even choir rehearsals! In September, we did a breakout gathering during coffee hour. Going forward, I want coffee hour to break into small groups to allow members to speak more intimately with each other than is possible when everyone is in a single Zoom room.

(2) Today, the world we live in is scary. The pandemic is scary enough. The countries that have dealt the best with it are countries with capable political leadership at the national level. To the extent that we have made progress in the United States, it has been largely due to political leadership at the state level. While Dr. Anthony Fauci and agencies such as the Centers for Disease Control are providing national leadership, national political leadership is not strong. The states that are doing well are those whose political leaders are taking the advice of Dr. Fauci and other medical leaders seriously and acting decisively.

(3) At the same time, our society is engaged in a reckoning about race that is unlike anything I have seen in my lifetime. It is, of course, contested. The outcome is uncertain. And the national political leadership is just not there.

It is just as important that we stay engaged with the reckoning on race as it is that we work to contain the coronavirus. Both are necessary if this nation is to survive and thrive.

It can survive. It can thrive. The church can fulfill its Mission of “welcoming and nurturing all with dignity and respect ...[and]... empowering them to act for justice in the world.” We can thrive.

In cyberspace and in the flesh and blood world, the Unitarian Church of Harrisburg matters.

The phrase “My country, right or wrong” is attributed to war hero Stephan Decatur in 1816 as an expression of patriotism. In a well-received 1871 speech, US Senator Carl Schurz modified the phrase to add an important condition: “My country, right or wrong; if right, to be kept right; and if wrong, to be set right.” Here in 2020, on the eve of one of the most important elections of our lifetime, how do we feel about this country of ours? And who’s included in “ours” anyway?

[Gather the Spirit for Justice](#) (GTSFJ) is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization that brings together Allison Hill residents, area organizations, businesses, and churches to address issues of social justice and economic equity. It was jointly founded by UCH and the Shared Ministry during the time we operated at 1508 Market Street. It now operates out of Christ Lutheran Church, 124 South 13th Street.

GTSFJ strives to be a place where people can find common ground, to meet and discuss the changes that need to be made to make Harrisburg a great place to live for all of its citizens.

During the COVID pandemic, GTSFJ is not open for community hours, but it is working to make its current space more usable for visitors. It also continues to work in Allison Hill by providing masks and hand washing stations in strategic locations near their Christ Lutheran Church and by encouraging voter engagement together with Power to the Hill.

### Congregational Survey

The deadline for completing the electronic survey for analysis was Sept. 30, and the MSC is deeply grateful to everyone who completed theirs. At this point, the MSC will use the Survey Monkey tools to analyze the data collected and organize it to present to potential ministers. It will also give us all an idea of who the UCH is and who we are looking for in our next settled minister. This will not be the final opportunity for gathering this information, however!



### Search Charettes

All those with opinions or insights into the search for UCH's next settled minister are invited to *share them* at a Ministerial Search Committee Charette! What is a charette? A charette is defined as "collaborative sessions in which stakeholders contribute to the solution of a project." Here's what this means in our case.

Project: The successful calling of a settled minister for the UCH.

Solution: The best way possible to complete the project.

Stakeholders: Those who care about and who will benefit from the success of the project.

Collaborative sessions: These will be Zoom meetings, currently planned for Oct. 18 and Oct. 25 in place of our regular 11:30 am "Virtual Coffee Hour." An additional mid-October weeknight date is to be determined.

## Helping People in Prison and Their Families

Although our church building is closed, people are in prison and they and their families are in need of support. Here's what's happening.

### Dauphin County Bail Fund

Three UCH members are serving as mainstays with the [Dauphin County Bail Fund](#) (DC|bf). They identify likely candidates held at the 850-bed prison, interview them, identify people who seem to be safe bets, recommend them to the bail fund committee, and take the bail money to the judge or courthouse. To date, Margaret Carrow, John Hargreaves and Darlene Kvaternik have recommended about 20 inmates and have posted more than \$250,000 in bail money.

The bail fund was started as result of the Mother's Black Mama's Day Bailout held in Atlanta in 2017. Please check out the [website](#) to learn more about the organization and to donate if you want to help.

## Religious Exploration (RE)

In the September issue of **THE REPORTER**, I mentioned how we are engaging in monthly theme-based ministry in our RE program. Well, last month our families received a packet full of readings and activities about “**Our Chalice**” via U.S. mail.

Now that we have learned about and understand our important UU symbol “Our Chalice,” we will be focusing on **Creating Sabbath Space**. Creating Sabbath Space comes from [Soul Matters Sharing Circle](#), a network of UU congregations who follow the same monthly themes so churches can more easily share small group material, as well as worship, sermon, music and children’s religious education resources.

Soul Matters shares with us that “the theological underpinning rests in two ancient ideas held in various forms across many religions: (1) In times of trouble, be extra sure to keep the Sabbath (i.e., make space for worship, rest and connection) and (2) Home altars help bring your faith into your daily life.”

October’s program will be sent out weekly via email in a pdf with our Children & Youth (C&Y) RE Newsletter. If you are not receiving our C&YRE newsletter, please contact [Cory](#) and she will add you to the list. If you are not receiving our C&YRE newsletter but would like to sign up for our Creating Sabbath Space program for the month of October, please sign up [online](#).

Each weekly installment will include three components:

- ✚ Guidance for building a family home altar, growing it each week by adding a new component one by one.
- ✚ A family worship to honor those weekly additions to your altar.
- ✚ A couple of “after-worship” activities to continue your family Sabbath time by connecting and relaxing together.

Cory will also hold weekly 30-minute Zoom meetings at 4:30 p.m. Thursdays for anyone who chooses to participate. *Please note: Attending the Zoom meetings is not a requirement to participate in this program.* We will hold our first Zoom call **Oct. 1** and every Thursday through **Nov. 5**. This will be a time to share our altar tables and discuss our experience.

This is something for anyone to participate in whether you come from a family of one or if there are several families living in the same household – “**you all**” are invited to join us!

Our weekly themes for October in **Creating Sabbath Space** include:

- Week 1: Welcome and Creating the Core Pieces of Our Chalice Home
- Week 2: Nurturing Ourselves by Caring for Others
- Week 3: Honoring Your Uniqueness
- Week 4: Honoring the Natural World
- Week 5: Celebrating Your Spiritual Community
- Week 6: Making Room for Grief and Loss

### UUtheVote


