staff, colleagues, and neighbors that typically make up much of my day. I can make no plausible prediction as to when we will resume in-person services. About the time you receive this edition of THE REPORTER, you will receive an actual stamped and mailed letter about the stewardship campaign to fund the church year that begins July 1, 2020. The stewardship mailing includes a pledge form and guidelines for pledging at different income levels. Circumstances are very different than they were a year ago, when we launched the stewardship campaign for the current church year. Hence the lateness of the initial stewardship mailing. Stewardship is also proceeding, only slightly delayed from our original date. We need to know how much our members can pledge in order to make a proper budget. Please see the separate article about this also.

We do know that the economic times are uncertain and that some have been more affected than others. We ask for your generosity, but we also understand that planning may be more challenging than normal this year.

Even in uncertain times, we must continue looking forward and plan for our future. Most other churches are moving forward as well. We will probably need to revisit the budget in a few months and adjust our plans accordingly. We are all learning to be adaptable these days, and we can do the same for our budget.

verall, our church has been on an upward trajectory for the last few years. Each year, we have improved our finances, strengthened our unity, and clarified our vision of who we are and how we wish to grow.

This is no time to stop. Despite the terrible disruption from COVID-19, we must keep ourselves connected and work for our future. Please know that your leaders are united in this, and we ask you to join us in nurturing our community and planning for the coming year.


This will be an interesting and enjoyable opportunity for our church community to gather together again. We look forward to seeing you there.

Virtual General Assembly, June 24-28

General Assembly (GA), originally scheduled for June 24-28 in Providence, RI, will be a virtual event this year. Last month, the UUA Board of Trustees passed a resolution to make the 2020 GA a 100% virtual event. This decision alleviates the anxiety and concern shared by many about how GA might proceed, given the impact of COVID-19. It also gives the UUA time to plan a more robust and rewarding virtual experience.

A virtual GA has many benefits, including a significant reduction in carbon footprint and the possibility of higher attendance, since it is more accessible for delegates and anyone else burdened by travel costs or time. For many years, the UUA has offered virtual attendance as an option. This year, the

UUA intends to scale and enhance technology to accommodate a more global audience. Across the country, UU congregations have embraced virtual meetings and Sunday services, and the UUA considers this an extension of that trend.

The theme this year is "Rooted, Inspired, & Ready!" As noted at the GA website, "We are in touch with our theological roots, we are engaged in transforming our faith, and we are fired up to take action in the wider world."



For those who have not yet ventured into Zoom, here are a few tips about connecting to Zoom, which I hope will help you be more comfortable in using it.


Connecting to Zoom

There are many devices (cell phones to tablets to desktops and more) you can use to access Zoom. From there, all you need is a the Zoom app (Andriods | iPhones) or an internet web browser.

If you are using a browser, go to https://zoom.us and click on the Join a Meeting link




On the next page, enter the Meeting ID and click the blue button that says Join.

Philosophy & Literature

Man's Search for Meaning is a 1946 book by Dr. Viktor Frankl chronicling his experiences as a prisoner in Nazi concentration camps and describing his psychotherapeutic method, which involved identifying a purpose in life to feel positive about and then immersively imagining that outcome. According to Frankl, the way prisoners imagined the future affected their longevity. The book intends to answer the question "How was everyday life in a concentration camp reflected in the mind of the average prisoner?" Part One is Frankl's analysis of his experiences in the concentration camps, while Part Two introduces his ideas of meaning and his theory, logotherapy.

According to a 2012 survey conducted by the Library of Congress, *Man's Search for Meaning* belongs to a list of "the ten most influential books in the United States." At the time of Frankl's death in 1997, the book had sold more than 10 million copies and had been translated into 24 languages.
